

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

Content

Throughout this two year course, students will employ many of the skills already familiar to them from KS3 such as inference, deduction and comprehension. Students will read an array of fiction and nonfiction texts from a variety of authors and time periods.

Paper 1, *Explorations in Creative Reading and Writing*, looks at how writers use narrative and descriptive techniques to engage the interest of readers. Whereas Paper 2, *Writers' Viewpoints and Perspectives*, looks at how different writers present a similar topic over time.

Students will also be given an opportunity to prepare and present ideas to their peers in the form of discussions, debates and presentations with the aim at securing the Speaking and Listening element of this qualification. Section A: Reading (40 marks)

- One literature fiction text

Questions based on Literature extract

- **Q.1 List four things about...** (4 marks)
- **Q.2 How does the writer use language to...?** (8 marks)
- **Q.3 How has the writer structured the text to interest you as a reader?** (8 marks)
- **Q.4 In response to a statement, students are asked 'to what extent do you agree/disagree?'** (20 marks)

Section B: Writing (40 marks)

- Descriptive or narrative writing

Creative composition question based on extract in Section A

An extended writing question with a theme and/or picture as a stimulus (24 marks for content, 16 marks for technical accuracy)

English Language Paper 2:

Written exam: 1 hour 45 minutes

80 marks

50% of GCSE English Language

Section A: Reading (40 marks)

- One non-fiction text and one literary non-fiction text linked by theme

Questions based on non fiction extracts

- **Q.1 Choose four statements which are TRUE/FALSE** (4 marks)
- **Q.2 Use details from both sources to write a summary of what you understand about the similarities/difference of...** (8 marks)
- **Q.3 How does the writer use language to describe...?** (12 marks)
- **Q.4 Compare how the writers convey their different attitudes towards...** (16 marks)

Section B: Writing (40 marks)

- Writing to present a viewpoint

An extended writing question were students write in the form of a letter, essay, speech, newspaper article or text for a leaflet to argue, persuade, inform or persuade a reader of their viewpoint. (24 marks for content, 16 marks for technical accuracy)

Non Examination Spoken Language:

Use of Standard English Separate qualification gaining a Pass, Merit or Distinction.

Speaking:

Students will be asked to organise and present a speech on a topic of their choice lasting between 3-6 minutes.

Listening:

Students will be expected to respond to questions confidently and with some development.
