Intent

Building on students' prior learning of philosophy and religion, students will explore a range of contemporary ethical themes and be challenged with questions about belief, values, meaning, purpose and truth, enabling them to develop their own attitudes towards religious and ethical issues. Students will continue to develop their religious literacy through gaining an appreciation of how religion, philosophy and ethics form the basis of modern British society and culture.
