Introduction

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum Music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

KS3 Curriculum Overview

Lessons in Year 7 and 8 occur once a fortnight (1 hour)

Lessons in Year 9 are on rotation with Dance and Drama, Students spend half a term in each area and are seen twice a year.

Students at KS3 predominantly learn to play the Keyboard and Ukulele, with students in year 9 having a Music Technology or Research option if not wishing to perform.

KS3 students will work through 8 termly projects over 3 years which will give them opportunities to perform and learn about musical theory, instruments and genres.

Each genre uses musical listening to support the theoretical aspects of the style.

KS4 Curriculum = Eduqas Exam Board

From the Specification:

Component 1: Performing Total duration of performances: 4-6 minutes Non-exam assessment: internally assessed, externally moderated 30% of qualification A minimum of two pieces, one of which must be an ensemble performance of at least one minute duration. The other piece(s) may be either solo and/or ensemble. One of the pieces performed must link to an area of study of the learner's choice.

Component 2: Composing Total duration of compositions: 3-6 minutes Non-exam assessment: internally assessed, externally moderated 30% of qualification Two compositions, one of which must be in response to a brief set by WJEC. Learners will choose one brief from a choice of four, each one linked to a different area of study. The briefs will be released during the first week of September in the academic year in which the assessment is to be taken. The second composition is a free composition for which learners set their own brief.

Component 3: Appraising Written examination: 1 hour 15 minutes (approximately) 40% of qualification This component is assessed via a listening examination. Eight questions in total, two on each of the four areas of study. Area of study 1: Musical Forms and Devices Area of study 2: Music for Ensemble Area of study 3: Film Music Area of study 4: Popular Music Two of the eight questions are based on extracts set by WJEC.

KS4 Students receive 5 periods (5 x 1 hour) over a fortnight for year 10 and 6 periods for year 11.

Lessons will be organised around the 3 required elements of the course: 2 composition lessons a fortnight with verbal feedback half termly. 3 Theory Lessons a fortnight looking at terminology and theory of the 4 areas of Study. Students will prepare performance over each half term and begin boosting confidence in this area before using the recording studio to record work for submission.

Students can attend the Dorset Music Hub GCSE concert with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra currently being held at Westlands Entertainment Venue in Yeovil.

Students mainly use Music Technology for the composition element of the course. The programs we use are Bandlab for Education, MuseScore and the opportunity to record live into Pro-Tools. Bandlab and Pro-tool allows students who do not read music confidently to use a DAW (Digital Audio Workstation) allowing recording and editing with the use of virtual and live instruments. Muse score allows the traditional note readers to use the score writing methods.

Students have timetabled lessons, lunchtimes and after school sessions in the recording studio where 1-1 support with the technician to record performance coursework where Pro-Tools software is used. Students are supported and given verbal feedback to support their progress and to improve their confidence.

KS5 Curriculum = Eduqas Exam Board

From the A-Level Specification:

Component 1: Externally assessed by a visiting examiner

Option A: Total duration of performances: 10-12 minutes Option A: 35% of qualification. A performance consisting of a minimum of three pieces. At least one of these pieces must be as a soloist. The other pieces may be either as a soloist or as part of an ensemble or a combination of both. One piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one area of study. At least one other piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one other, different area of study.

Option B: Total duration of performances: 6-8 minutes Option B: 25% of qualification Performing (25%) A performance consisting of a minimum of two pieces either as a soloist or as part of an ensemble or a combination of both. One piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one area of study.

Component 2: Externally assessed by WJEC

Option A: Total duration of compositions: 4-6 minutes Option A: 25% of qualification. Two compositions, one of which must reflect the musical techniques and conventions associated with the Western Classical Tradition and be in response to a brief set by WJEC. Learners will have a choice of four set briefs, released during the first week of September in the academic year in which the assessment is to be taken. The second composition is a free composition.

Option B: Total duration of compositions: 8-10 minutes Option B: 35% of qualification. Three compositions, one of which must reflect the musical techniques and conventions associated with the Western Classical Tradition and be in response to a brief set by WJEC. Learners will have a choice of four set briefs, released during the first week of September in the academic year in which the assessment is to be taken. The second composition must reflect the musical characteristics of one different area of study (i.e. not the Western Classical Tradition) while the third composition is a free composition.

Component 3:

Appraising Written examination: 2 hours 15 minutes (approximately) 40% of qualification

Three areas of study:

Area of study A: The Western Classical Tradition *(The Development of the Symphony 1750-1900) which includes two set works. Choose one set work for detailed analysis and the other for general study. Symphony No. 104 in D major, 'London': Haydn Symphony No. 4 in A major, 'Italian': Mendelssohn A choice of one area of study from:*

1 of the following 3 options:

Area of study B: Rock and Pop

Area of study C: Musical Theatre

Area of study D: Jazz

A choice of one area of study from:

Area of study E: *Into the Twentieth Century including two set works: Trio for Oboe, Bassoon and Piano, Movement II: Poulenc Three Nocturnes, Number 1, Nuages: Debussy*

Area of study F: *Into the Twenty-first Century including two set works: Asyla, Movement 3, Ecstasio: Thomas Adès String Quartet No. 2 (Opus California) Movements 1 (Boardwalk) and 4 (Natural Bridges): Sally Beamish*

Year 12 Students receive 9 periods over a fortnight studying the AS-Level Music course

Year 13 Students receive 9 periods over a fortnight studying the A-Level Music course

Both Year 12 and 13 are taught in the same lesson.

Lessons will be organised around the 3 required elements of the course: Performance, Composition, Listening. Students will perform every half term for internal assessment. Composition lessons will happen 3 times a fortnight and 8 lessons a fortnight will focus on the listening element of the course based on the Area of Studies.

Students can use Music Technology for the composition element of the course. The same programs as GCSE are used however students are also allowed to use music programs of their own choice as long as they allow for the criteria and format of the exam board to be met.

Students perform their recitals every 3 weeks and are recorded so they are able to listen back to critique their work to support progress in their specialist lessons with their instrumental teachers.

SEND

We adapt music to be accessible to students. SEND students are supported with adapted music which utilises shapes and colours. TA's are supportive of the subject and are engaged in actively supporting the young people. Students with sensitivity concerns are supported through allowing the use of headphones, ear defenders, ear plugs or a separate space allowing for them to feel more confident in their progress.

Graded Music Exams

All students who wish to take graded music exams with an awarding body such as ABRSM, Trinity, Rockschoo, are encouraged and supported. The instrumental teachers will ensure students are prepared for the Aural and Technical techniques required alongside the chosen pieces. The Academy fully supports students when scheduled to take place during the school day.

Part B: Co-Curricular Music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Instrumental Lessons

Provided on a variety of instruments: Flute, Clarinet, Saxophone, Piano, Guitar, Bass Guitar, Ukulele, Drum Kit & Voice Lessons.

We provide 10 x 30 minute lessons per term at a cost to parents.

As an Academy we would like to support all those who wish to learn a musical instrument and we can assist with financial support on a case by case basis for Pupil Premium students. This support currently stands at 50% of the lesson fees. We also direct parents to apply to Changing Keys Dorset <https://changingkeydorset.co.uk/> for financial support if not in receipt of the Pupil Premium fund.

Group lessons can be organised with students of the same standard (not available for Piano or Drums).

Students can be entered for Graded Practical and Theory Music exams with the ABRSM, Trinity College or Rock School.

We have a number of instruments available to loan for free to students who wish to have lessons and purchasing an instrument is a barrier. A loan agreement is signed by the parents and instruments are returned once purchase of their own is made.

Extra-Curricular activities:

Singing Group

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth

Rehearses on a weekly basis a range of popular songs ready for performances at Christmas and Summer concerts,

Musical Theatre Club

Led by Miss Marsh

Rehearses on a weekly basis a range of popular songs from the musicals ready for performances at Christmas and Summer concerts.

Keyboard club KS3 and KS4

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth

Students have free access to the keyboards during 1 lunchtime a week (Mondays).

They can bring their own music to practise, catch up on class work or be provided with a selection of music they may wish to learn.

Music Theory Support

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth

A lunchtime drop in session for students wishing to develop their theoretical understanding of music and can be prepared for Theory Exams. Grade 6+ link to UCAS Points for further education.

GCSE Music Support

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth

An after school session for those studying GCSE Music to use the recording studio, complete compositions, catch-up on outstanding and missing work, to recap any topics which need further investigation.

A-Level Music Support

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth

A session for those studying A-Level and As Level Music to use the recording studio, complete compositions, catch-up on outstanding and missing work, to recap any topics which need further support.

Bud-Band *new Sept 2025*

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth with support of year 10 band Knock 'N' Run (Wednesday Lunchtime)

For those who would like to learn an instrument and perform as part of a large group

Opportunities to share our progress can be given at the Christmas and Summer showcases. We will also attend any music making opportunities offered by the Music Hub.

Bud-Drum *new Sept 2025*

For those who would like to play the African Djembe Drums (Tuesday Lunchtime)

Opportunities to share our progress can be given at the Christmas and Summer showcases. We will also attend any music making opportunities offered by the Music Hub.

Music Tech Club*new Sept 2025*

Led by Mrs Shuttleworth (after school Tuesday)

For those who would like to learn how to create music using a Digital Audio Workstation (DAW). Bandlab for Education. Students will be taught how to use the program and will be set mini projects to create music to a short brief. We will celebrate their achievements at the end of each project by sharing their work with the group.

6th Form Enrichment

Led by Mr Davidson (1 hour a week - Wednesday period 5)

Students in Year 12 can opt to 'make music' and team up with others to enjoy music making. Students can use the facilities of the Music Department including the Recording studio. Advice and support for those wishing to advance will also be given.

Inter-School Competitions.

The Performing Arts Department runs a number of competitions throughout the year to allow students to demonstrate their individual talents in the Arts. These can range from auditions for musicals and variety shows, to

Budmouth Supports the Dorset Music Hub and publicises via Google classroom and the Academy facebook site any opportunities for music making that the students can get involved in outside of the Academy.

Part C: Musical Experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Musical

This will be organised for December 2026 and will happen Bi-annually.

Tickets sales support the costs of the next Musical, including the licensees, hire fees, props, set and costumes. Rehearsals take place after school and all students are welcomed to take part. Auditions are held for the main parts.

Christmas Show

This will be organised for December 2025 in rotation with the Musical. It is a variety show of Music, Dance and Drama involving our extra-curricular clubs and gives students opportunities to display their talents. Our previous Christmas show had a focus on 'Musicals'.

Ticket and refreshment sales support the costs of the next Musical as above.

Summer Showcase

This is organised for July 2026 and is the end of term show for students to display their work for GCSE and A-Level Music and Dance, extra-curricular clubs and their own individual talents.

Tickets and refreshment sales support the costs of the next Musical as above

Budmouths got Talent

This is a fundraiser for the Academy and students are free to sign up and take part.

Lip Sync Battle

This is a fundraiser for the Academy which involves staff and students.

Open Evenings

Students involved in extra-curricular clubs, GCSE and A-level courses support the music department with performances and workshops throughout the evening as Year 6 parents tour the Academy in September to promote applications for admission Sept 2026.

Prize givings

Students involved in Musical Theatre Club or Singing Group, open the awards evening to start the celebrations of students achievement. The audience is the parents of those receiving awards and staff.

Lunchtime Concerts

The academic year 2025 - 2026 will see the introduction of half termly lunchtime concerts for both KS3 and KS4&5. These will begin in December 2025. Students and staff will be able to bring their lunch and be entertained by students wishing to share their talents and gain their confidence in a smaller and more familiar venue of the music classroom.

In School Workshops.

We provide workshops in Musical theatre workshops using past Alumni and professionals touring companies within the industry. These combine the 3 strands of Performing Arts - Music, Dance and Drama.

Possible Trips

Weymouth Pavilion, Southampton Mayflower, Bristol Hippodrome, London Theatre Trips are all within a few hours of Weymouth, allowing access to a wide variety of shows within the Arts that we organise trips to - Music, Musical Theatre, Dance, Drama.

Summer Fayre

Students are invited to provide the entertainment during the summer fayre by performing live in an outside environment.

Support of World Music Day

Sun 21st June 2026 - Budmouth can support on Friday 19th June. Music will be played at some point in tutor time and/or lessons, either as students arrive, starters, plenaries, midway through to refocus students. Music chosen is up to the individual subject staff and can be revision songs for the topics being studied in lessons to support teaching.

In the Future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

To ensure that as an Academy we look to fulfil the key features set out in the National Plan for Music Education.

1. Timetabled curriculum music of at least one hour each week of the school year for KS1-3

To look at the timetable and staffing to see if it is viable to return to 1 hour per week for KS3 with a specialist. This would then meet the Model Music Curriculum and National plan for music education requirements.

2. Access to lessons across a range of instruments, and voice

To continue financial support where requested to allow all students to have the opportunity to learn. The Pupil Premium fund currently supports 50% of the lesson fees.

3. A school choir or vocal ensemble

To continue to run an extra-curricular singing group and participate in all singing opportunities we can throughout the academic year within the Academy and within the local community/Music Hub.

4. A school ensemble, band or group

Continue to offer a wide range of extra-curricular opportunities looking at the strengths of the year groups and their interests. Develop and extend clubs to allow access for all.

5. Space for rehearsals and individual practice

Due to re-build of the Academy within the next 5 years we need to retain the 3 practice rooms, music recording studio and a minimum of one classroom. There is also a need for a music storage room to securely store the instruments and resources which are currently scattered around the department. Ideally a computer suite set up with computers, midi keyboards and headphones to encourage music technology and to save on time when setting up current old laptops.

6. A termly school performance

Autumn Term: Christmas Showcase or the Musical, (Dec)

Nursing Home/Asda

Open Evenings (Sept)

Lunchtime concerts (Dec)

Spring Term: Academy fundraisers,

2 x Lunchtime concerts (Feb/April)

Summer Term: Summer showcase (July)

Prize Givings (June) if asked

2 x Lunchtime concerts (May/July)

Due to the rebuild of our main performance space (Clare Hall) within the next 5 years, we need to ensure that an adequate provision will be provided for space, sound and audio to allow us to continue to create high quality performances which allow all students to receive a taste of how professional theatres operate.

7. Opportunity to enjoy live performance at least once a year

Continue to organise trips to theatres across the south west, including Weymouth Pavilion, Southampton Mayflower & Bristol Hippodrome.
